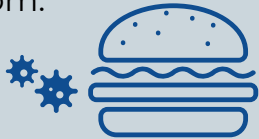


hepatitis **A**

Hepatitis A is most commonly spread by eating food that was touched by somebody who did not wash their hands after going to the bathroom.



hepatitis **B**

Hepatitis B is spread when the blood, semen, and/or vaginal fluids of a person living with hepatitis B enters the body of another person.



hepatitis **C**

Hepatitis C is spread when the blood from a person living with hepatitis C enters the bloodstream of someone who does not have it.



PREVENTION, TESTING, AND TREATMENT ARE AVAILABLE

Anybody can get hepatitis A, B, and/or C.

To prevent the spread of hepatitis B and C, be sure to:

- Use your own personal hygiene items - don't share razors, toothbrushes, nail clippers, etc.
- Use barrier methods during vaginal, anal, and oral sex.
- Use new and clean equipment for tattooing.
- Use new injection, smoking, or snorting equipment.

The best way to prevent hepatitis A and B is by getting vaccinated.

**There is no vaccine for hepatitis C.
...but there is a CURE!**

- Medications are available to treat hepatitis B and to cure hepatitis C with little to no side effects.

Most people don't have any hepatitis B and C symptoms, so get tested!
